Filmmakers and food lovers Jen and Grant dive into the issue of waste from farm, through retail, all the way to the back of their own fridge. After catching a glimpse of the billions of dollars of good food that is tossed each year in North America, they pledge to quit grocery shopping cold turkey and survive only on discarded food. What they find is truly shocking.

No Impact Man tells the story of author Colin Beavan, who went completely "green," giving up virtually all of the comforts of modern living -- electricity, gas-powered transportation, shipped food and public waste disposal. The cameras capture the toll this wellintentioned, year-long project takes on Beavan's wife and baby daughter, as well as the ways it brings this family closer together.
